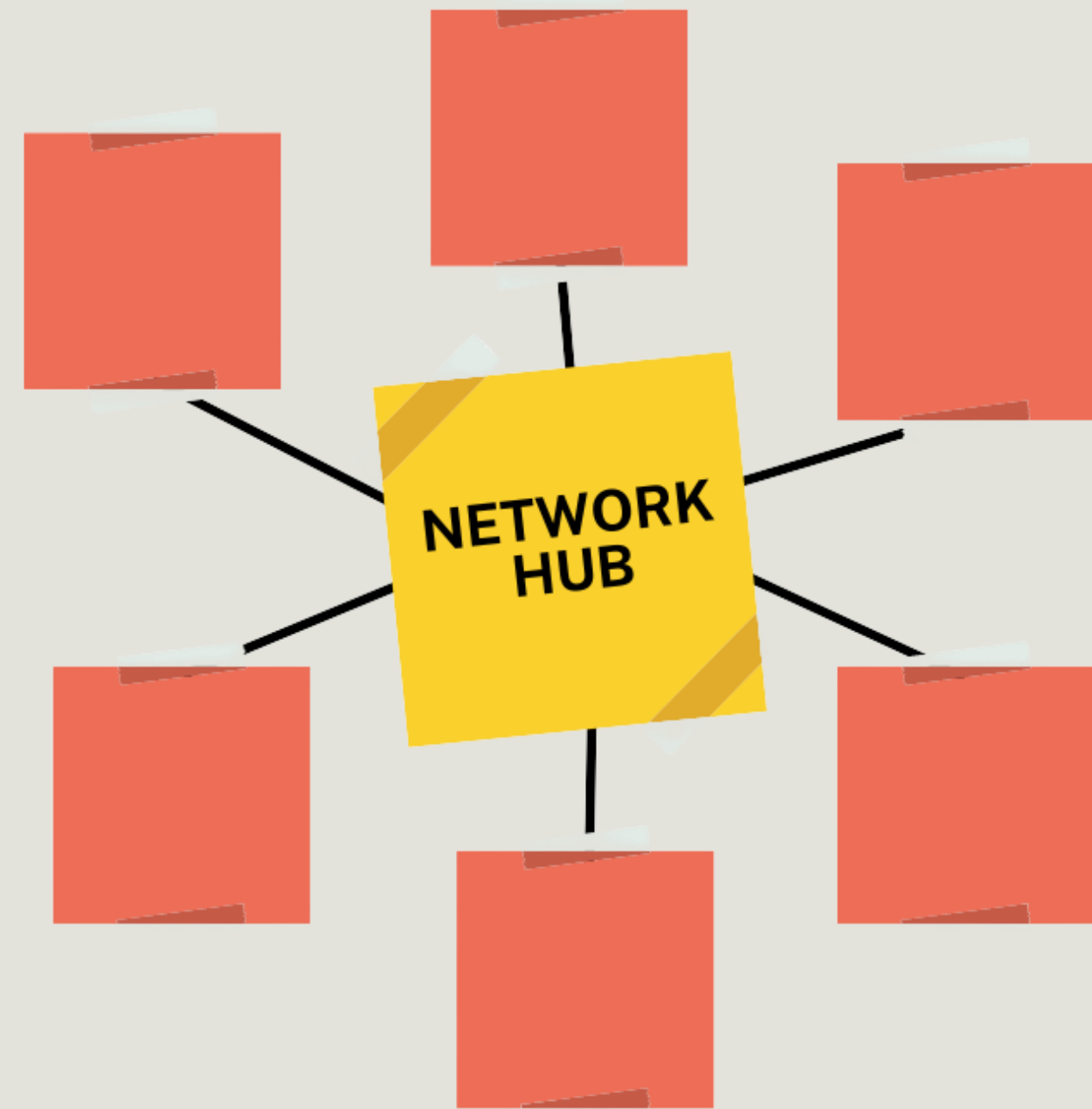

# MAP YOUR NETWORK

## Step One:

With yourself as the Network Hub, who are your connections?



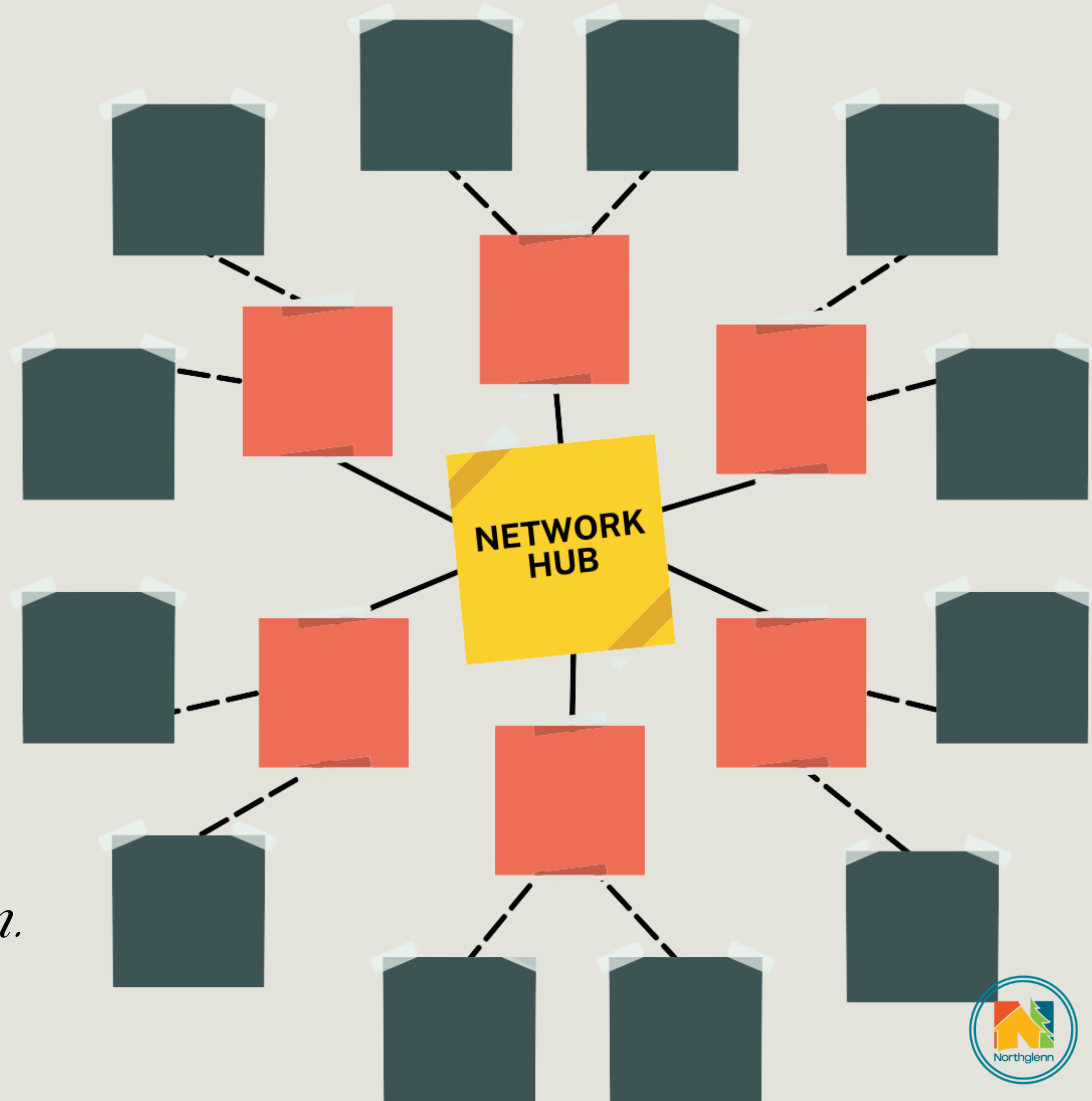
# MAP THEIR NETWORK

Step Two:

Who are your connections connected to?

Map their networks.

*Think of 6 Degrees of Kevin Bacon.*

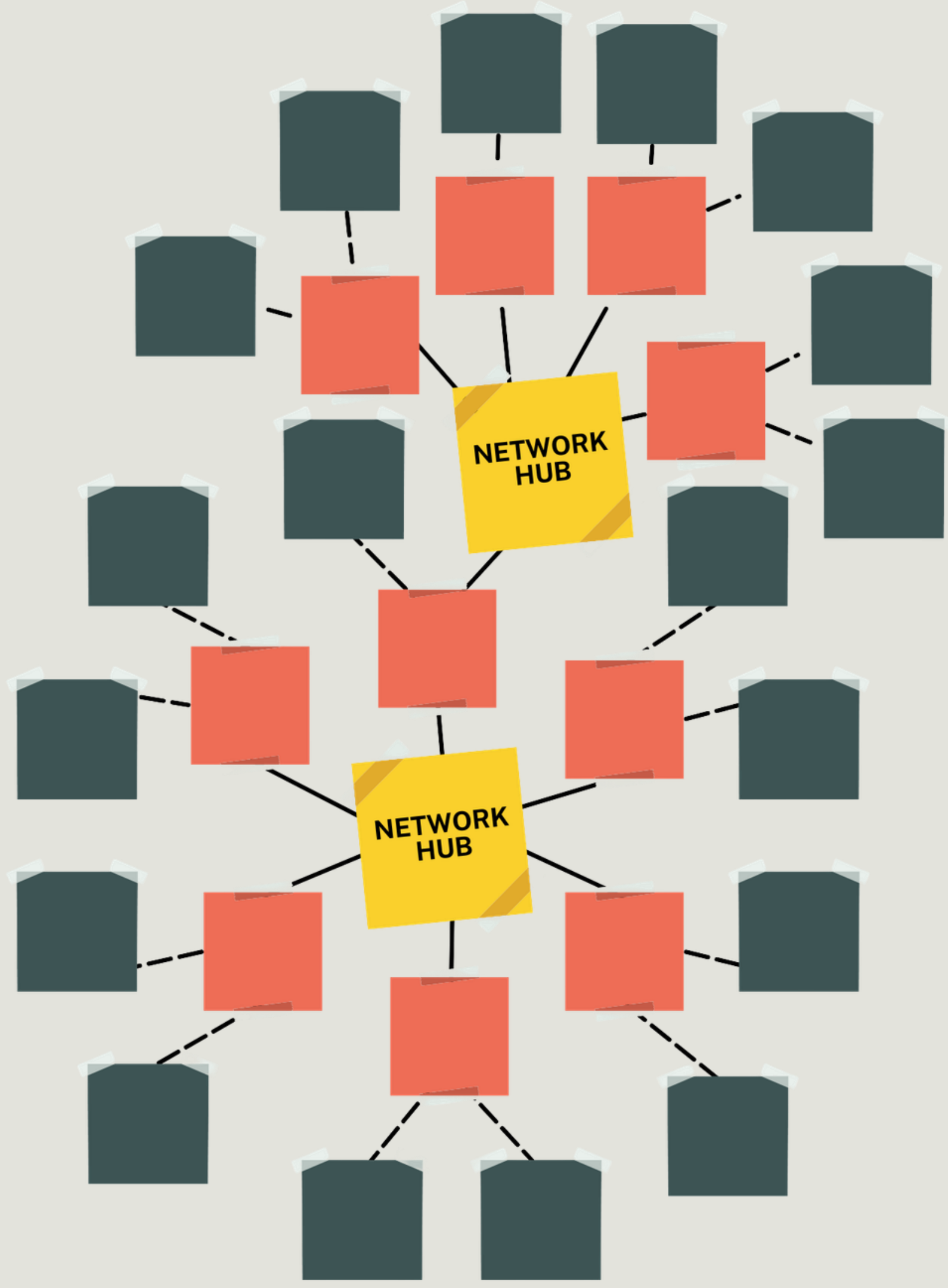


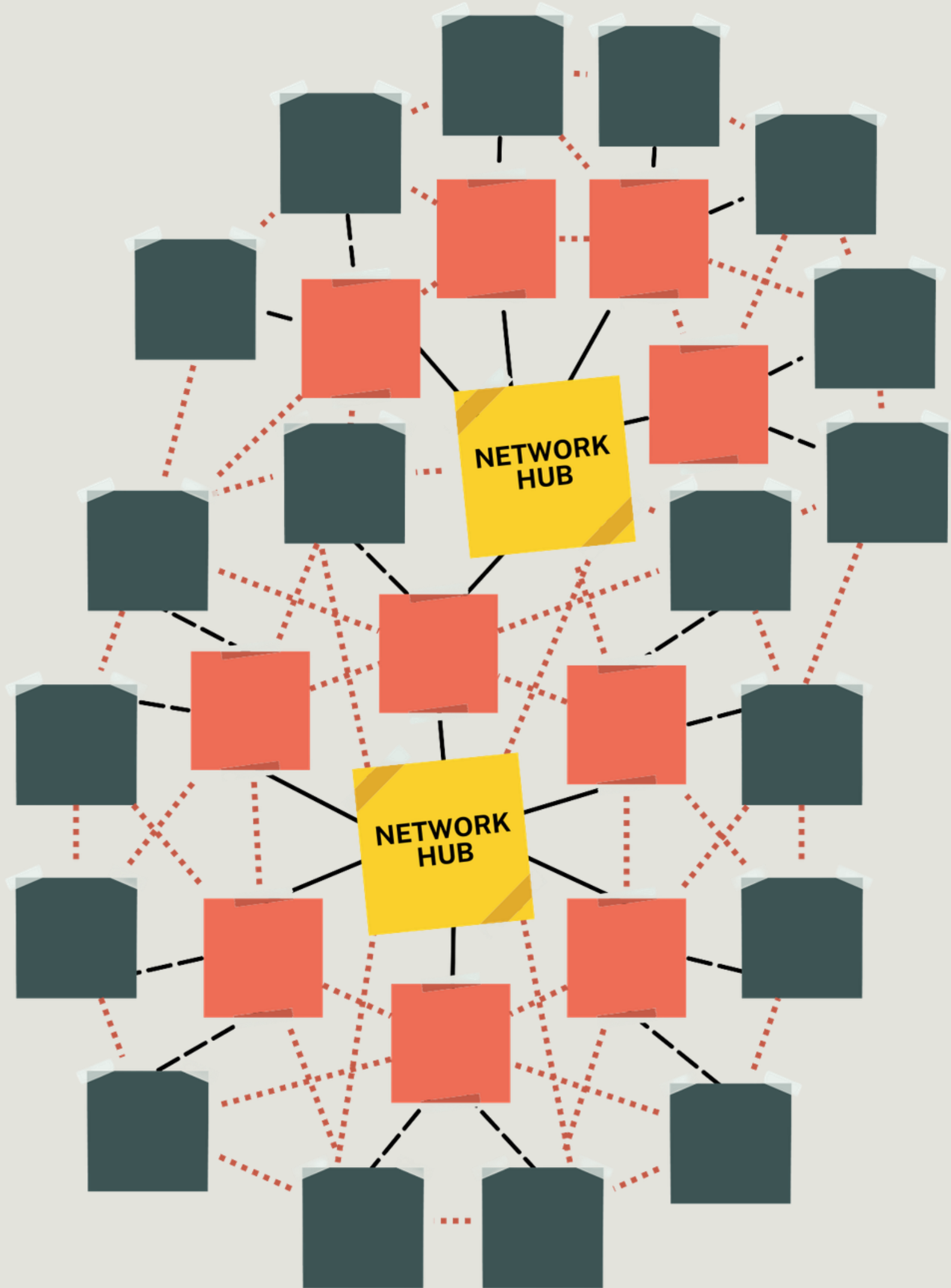
# IDENTIFY OTHER HUBS

Step Three:

Are there any individuals who are potential Network Hubs?

*Look at individuals who are connected to many other individuals or organizations.*



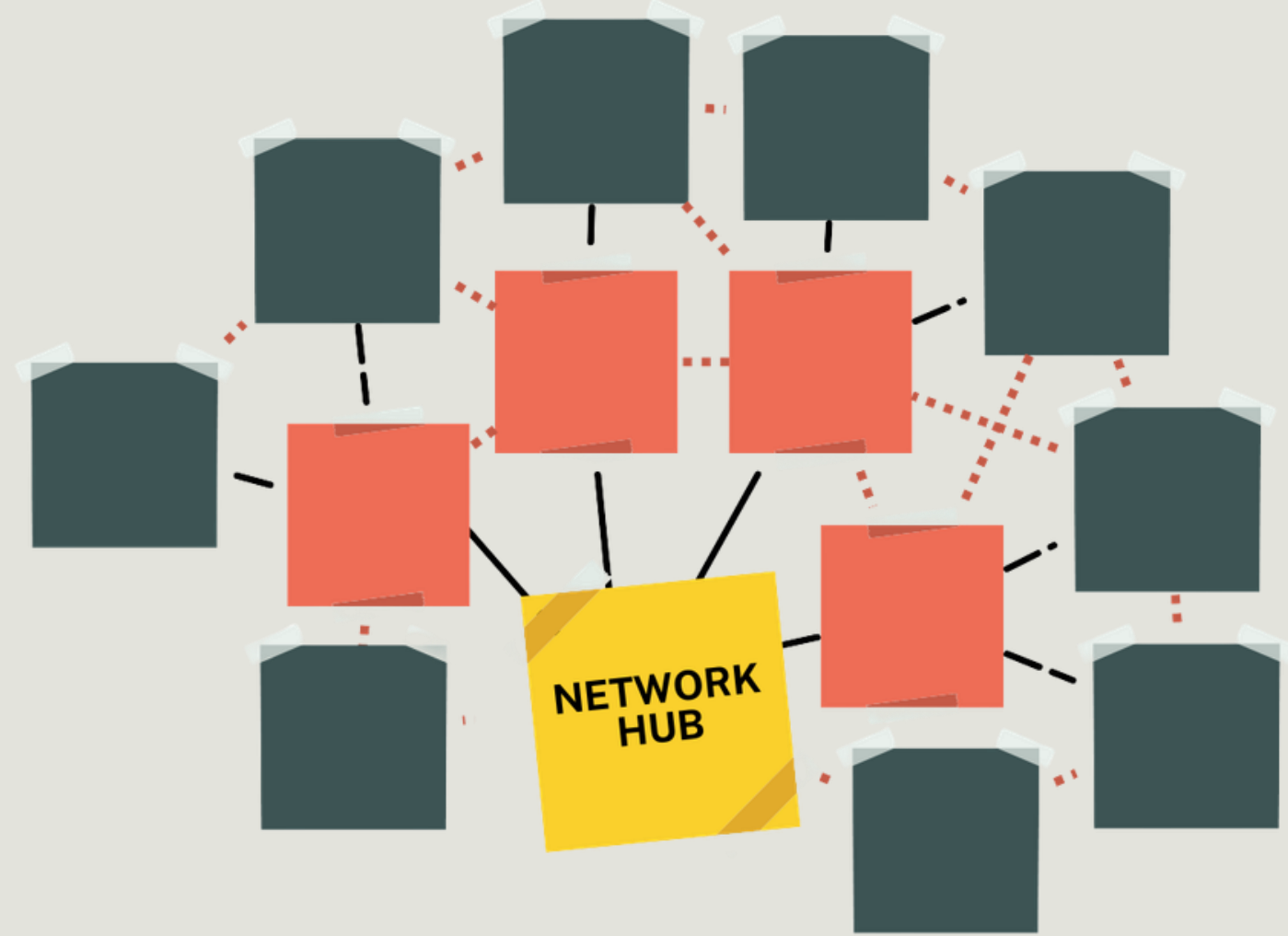


# IDENTIFY CONNECTIONS

Step Four:

Who in the network isn't connected but would benefit from being connected?

*Make intentional connections to decentralize the hub where possible – don't be a bottle neck.*



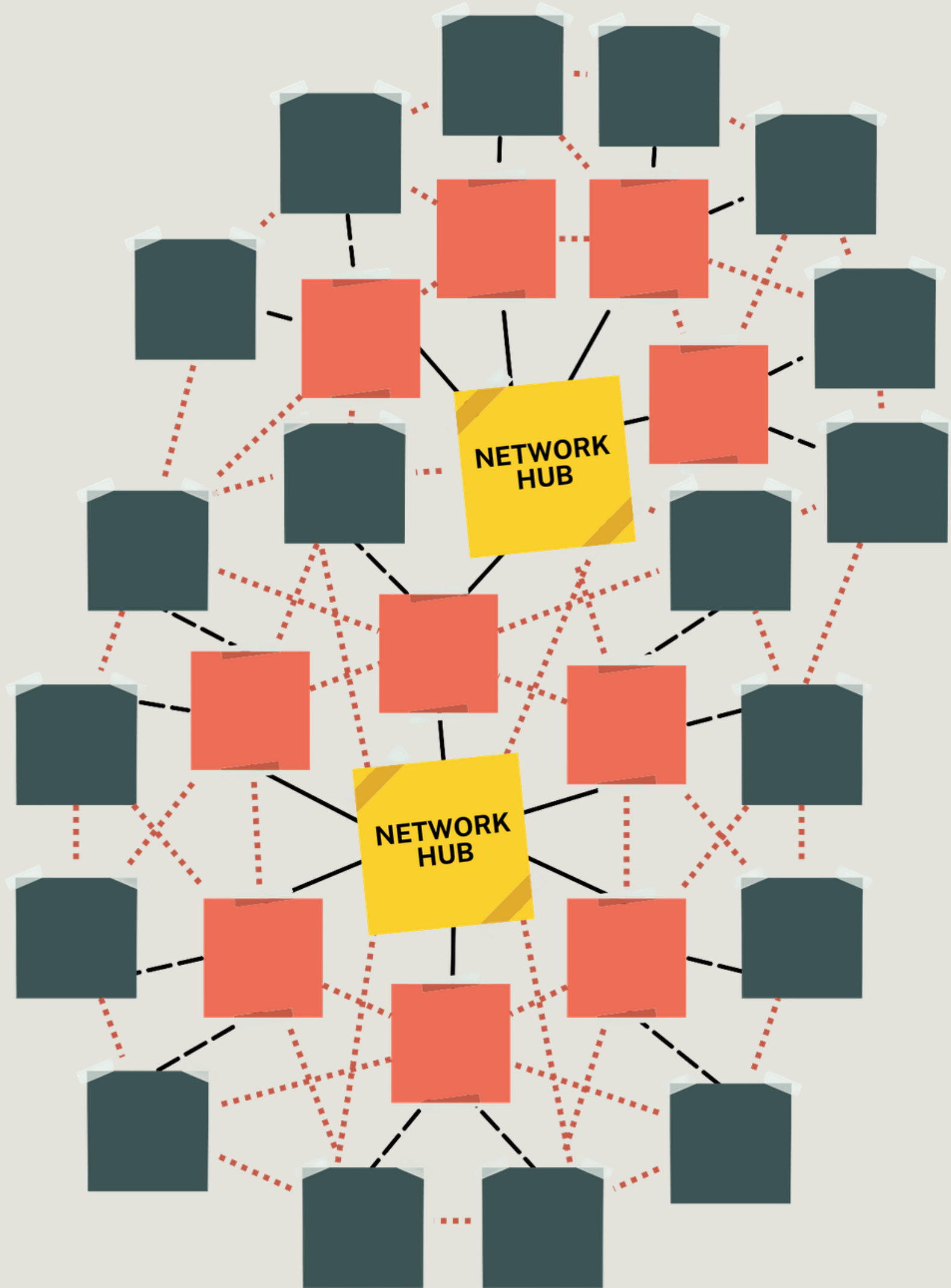
# WHO IS ISOLATED?

Step Five:

Who isn't in the network but would benefit from being integrated?

*Extend an invitation.*





# IDENTIFY MOTIVATIONS

Step Six:

What is the common or shared goal, motivation or intent of your network?

*Be solution or goal oriented, offer space for collaboration within the network to solve problems.*

How will you form connections between members of your network?

If you identified another Hub in your network, how will you collaborate with them to expand your network?

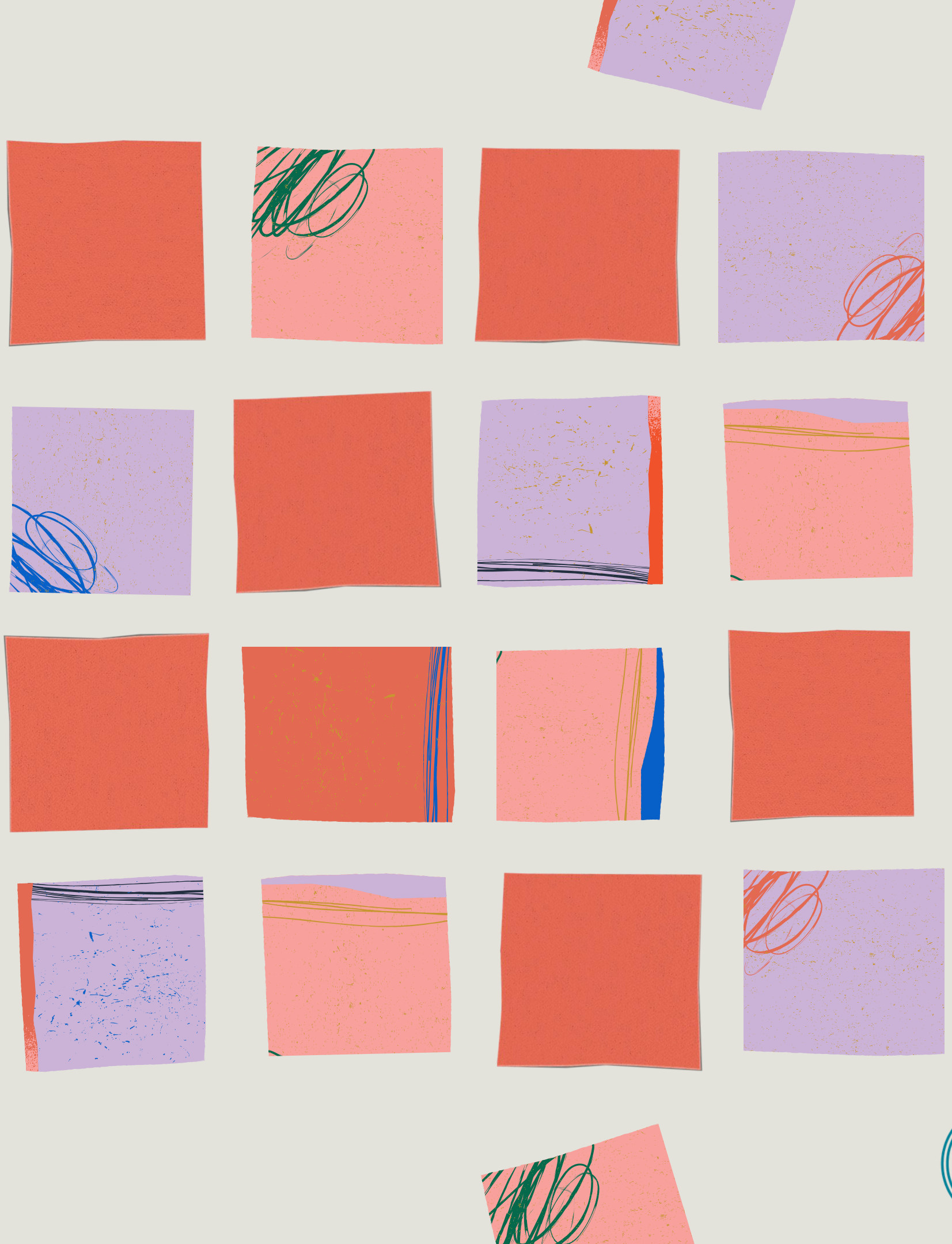
